FOUNDER'S WEEK

Last week was Founder's Week. Each year, it is the celebration of the work of Blessed Edmund Rice, the man who started the Christian Brothers in Ireland.

1762: Edmund Rice was born in Westcourt, Callan, Co. Kilkenny on 1st of June.

Educated initially "under his parents' roof", as a child he attended a local hedge school in Callan. Later he was educated in part by the Augustinian Friar Patrick Grace. 1779 When he was about 17 he moved to Waterford to begins an apprenticeship with his uncle, Michael Rice, who was a victualler and ship's chandler in that city.

1785: When he was about 23 years of age Edmund married Mary Elliott...

1786: Robert Rice, his father, died and Edmund was the executor of his father's will.

1789: Edmund's wife died at Ballybricken while giving birth to a "delicate" daughter, also named

Mary. She was born prematurely and was handicapped. Edmund moved to 3 Arundel Place to be nearer his business and be able to take care of his young daughter. Around the same time he joined a group of young Catholic men who gathered for prayer and outreach to the poor.

1793: Several important events happened in Edmund's life around this time and he began to dream of ways of helping the poor through education:

1795: Soon after the death in April of his friend, the poet Tadhg Gaelach O'Súilleabháin, came the death of his younger brother, Michael, and of his uncle Michael Rice. Edmund inherited his uncle's extensive business.

1798: Three of Nano Nagle's Presentation Sisters arrived in Waterford. Edmund assists the sisters in establishing a convent, leasing land on Henessy's Road for their convent and organising public collections to raise funds for the new building.

1800: This was Edmund's most successful year in business because of a wartime boom. Edmund began teaching street children by night after work in his house in Barronstrand Street, eventually deciding to sell his business "to Mr. Quan" and dedicate his life to educating them. Unpaid volunteers came to help him in those early days.

1802: Edmund is joined by Thomas Grosvenor and Patrick Finn. The three men created a little community over a stable in New Street, which they were now using as a school.

1803: A purpose built monastery and school opened in Ballybricken, Waterford which was named "Mount Sion" by Bishop Hussey. The Brothers moved in to the unfinished house on June 7th, though it was only officially blessed by the new Bishop of Waterford, Monsignor John Power the following year.

1808: Edmund and six companions take five vows for one year on August 15th as members of the Society of the Presentation. They were to become known as "Gentlemen of the Presentation". Edmund became known as "Brother Ignatius" in the community. A Chapter was held in Mount Sion and Edmund was appointed Superior.

1809: Again on August 15th, Edmund and seven other Brothers received their religious habit and "pronounced their perpetual simple vows of Poverty, Chastity, Obedience, Gratuitous instruction of the Poor, and Perseverance in the Society until death".

1825: First school opened in England, at Preston in Lancashire. More schools follow in Manchester, Liverpool, Sunderland and London.

1838: Edmund Rice resigned as Superior General and retired to Mount Sion. Michael Paul Riordan was elected as second Superior General.

1840: Edmund Rice makes a farewell tour of the Irish Schools and Brothers Communities.

1841: Edmund became seriously ill. A General Chapter was held that year at which he was refused participation.

1844: Edmund died at Mount Sion, Waterford on 29th August, aged 82.

6 Oct 1996: Pope John Paul II declares Edmund Rice "Blessed" in St. Peter's Square in Rome.
















Day of Notables Project **** PERSON WHO CONTRIBUTED TO AUSTRALIA ****

For this presentation, you must:

- Research a person on whom you will become an expert.
- They can be alive or dead, infamous or famous.

Suggestions - a politician, an inventor, a scientist, an explorer...

FOCUS QUESTION:

How and why is this person someone of significance?

Explain the significance of this person upon their time, those around them, the future, etc.

There are no boundaries or limitations regarding the depth of your research.



<u>Task 1</u> – prepare a display on your person as per the accompanying checklist and poster ideas.

<u>Task 2</u> – dress-up as something or someone associated with your topic and become so knowledgeable that you can answer questions about your topic. Dress-up options may include, but are certainly not limited to, the following:

- your actual person of significance
- an object of significance to that person
- colours associated with your person (eg. national colours)

POSTER

Setting out your poster: Your poster gives you the opportunity to present the broad range of information and the extensive research you have gathered.

Organise information under clear sub-headings. Some options to consider (not all ideas will apply to your project):

- art portrait
- a timeline of events
- quotes
- other images
- how this person and associated events have influenced or shaped Australia as a nation (or other country/industry/invention)

You don't have to set it out exactly like this. You can set it out in any way that your artistic spirit demands.

<u>DISPLAY CHECKLIST</u> – the following are <u>suggestions</u> only

Tablecloth - This may be plain or it may in some way relate to your topic (flag colours, or symbols attached to an old sheet are some suggestions). A display looks polished and attractive with a tablecloth.
Name of Notable – displayed in large letters
Your name
Poster - A summary of the main details of your topic. This will be a main feature of your display. Ideas and suggestions of what to include on your poster have been provided.
Costume - Keep this as simple and low-cost as possible. Use old clothes, borrow items and improvise.
Question box - Choose ten questions about your 'Notable' in which you feel confident to answer. Each question is to be written on a card or slip of paper and put into a box to be drawn out by people visiting your display.
Personality box/items - This may contain symbolic items relating closely to your 'Notable'. These items add interest and are enjoyable to those who visit your display. An old shoebox might be used to contain these items or you can spread them across the table.
Quotations - Make sure these stand out (use large, or colourful print). They might be words that your 'Notable' said within a speech, a quote from a book or words that someone else has used to describe him or her.
Pictures of the Notable - Can be printed, photocopied or drawn.
Timeline of Notable's life - Images, dates and brief summaries will help.
Food* - This may relate to your 'Notable's' life or country of origin.
Model* - A simple version of something the notable invented, discovered or developed, if appropriate or applicable. A 3D model will help your display look fuller.
PowerPoint/Prezi/Slideshow display* - Be creative!
Activities* These may include quizzes, wordsearches, colouring competitions, or hands-on experiences.
Giveaways/prizes* These might include something small (and inexpensive) that represents the 'Notable' in some way.

*These items are <u>not</u> compulsory but will certainly add to the effect of your display.












SYDNEY & MACKILLOP SPORTING TRIALS 2019
