

What is Cyberbullying?

Cyberbullying is the use of technology to bully a person or group with the intent to hurt them socially, psychologically or even physically.

I think my child is being bullied

Your child may not tell you if they are experiencing bullying behaviour online because of a fear it might make things worse for them or they may lose access to their devices and the internet.

Signs to watch for:

- being upset after using the internet or their mobile phone
- · appearing lonelier or distressed
- unexpected changes in friendship groups
- a decline in their school work
- changes in their sleep patterns
- becoming secretive about their online activities and mobile phone use
- a decline in their physical health
- · avoidance of school or clubs
- changes in personality, becoming more withdrawn, anxious, sad or angry

What does cyberbullying look like?

Examples of cyberbullying include:

- · abusive texts and emails
- hurtful messages, images or videos
- imitating, excluding or humiliating others online
- spreading nasty online gossip and chat
- creating fake accounts in someone's name to trick or humiliate them

What to do?

Please contact your son's Teacher or Mr Woodbury as soon as possible. Any bullying is not OK and will not just disappear without intervention.

Online bullying can have a devastating impact on young people, whose online life is a key part of their identity and how they interact socially.

NAPLAN 2019

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. It has been an everyday part of the School calendar since 2008.

NAPLAN tests the sorts of skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life, such as reading, writing, spelling and numeracy. The assessments are undertaken nationwide, every year, in the second full week in May.



NAPLAN is made up of tests in the four areas (or 'domains') of:

RESILIENCE

What is resilience?

Resilience is your ability to cope with tough times by applying your inner strength and engaging support networks. Resilience can not only enable you to face difficult situations, but often provides an opportunity to further develop your coping skills.

Coping with challenges

Stress and setbacks are a part of life, and you can't avoid them. A series of small challenges, or a traumatic situation, can be hard to deal with. If you know you can cope with adversity, that can give you the confidence to get through tough situations.

Coping strategies can enable you to deal with stress and maintain a sense of control in your life. There are many different ways of coping with stress and everyone is different, so it's about finding something that works for you. Anything that is not harmful to your health and wellbeing could be worth a try, such as:

- · taking time out to relax
- · exercise or meditation
- breaking a challenge down into small, achievable goals
- celebrating achieving your goals
- keeping a journal
- thinking about the big picture



Strengthening resilience

Resilience enables you to better cope with challenging situations and helps with your mental wellbeing. You probably already have skills and support networks that help you be resilient. You can build these up even more, making it easier for you to cope with life.

You can build your resilience by:

- knowing your strengths
- building your self-esteem have confidence in your abilities and the positive things in life
- build healthy relationships
- · knowing when to ask for help
- managing stress and anxiety levels
- working on problem solving skills and coping strategies.

The Primary students have been off to a busy start in the Library this year, with the boys already taking part in a number of Information Literacy skill building tasks and Literature focused events.

Both Year 5 and 6 took part in a scavenger hunt which introduced Year 5 students to the Waterford Learning Centre resources and provided Year 6 students with a refresher on all things Library. The boys enjoyed working in groups to find and decipher the many clues hidden throughout books and resources.





Accelerated Reader is also off to an encouraging start with a number of students already reading and completing quizzes on multiple books. Students are encouraged to read a minimum of 20 minutes per night in order to stay on track towards achieving their reading goal by the end of Term 2.

Another exciting Library event was our visit from Scientist, Ruben Meerman. The students were very excited to meet the "Surfing Scientist" in person, and many of them recognised Ruben from his time on the ABC. He is also the author of numerous books, including 'The Surfing Scientist: 40 Cool Science Tricks for Kids', many of these which he demonstrated to the boys.

CBHS Lewisham Primary Athletics Carnival 2019 Sydney Olympic Park – Warm Up Track Friday, 3 May - Week 1, Term 2

Notes regarding the Carnival:

- Boys are required to come to school at normal time
- Boys are to wear school sports uniform including hat they may bring a colour t-shirt of their House to wear during the carnival
- Buses will be leaving at 8.45am. The boys will travel to the carnival in their House groups
- Boys need to bring their morning tea, lunch and drinks for the day
- Boys may wear spikes for 100m & 200m races
- Age groups for the carnival include Under 12; Under 11 Yr 6; Under 11 Yr5; Under 10
- All events will be decided on times 100m & 200m (no Finals)
- The carnival will be a selection trial for the Sydney Catholic Schools' Athletics Carnival.
- The boys will compete in field events: Shot Put; Long Jump; Discus; & High Jump
- The carnival is a compulsory school event and all boys are expected to attend
- If a boy cannot compete, a note must be supplied the boy will attend the carnival and have a role on the day
- All boys that require medication need to make sure they have that medication on them at all times.
- The carnival will conclude around 2pm parents may sign out their sons from the CLASS TEACHER.
- All boys who have not been signed out by 2.15pm will return to school
