ANZAC Day This week we commemorated ANZAC Day.

As our normal reflection I thought I would like to share this extract given by the Prime Minister, Mr John Howard, at the Hellfire Pass, Thailand, 25th April 1998.

"As we gather here to face the dawn, we honour those who faced the night. Not a night of rest nor dreams, not a night of shared laughter or the warmth of homefire, but a monstrous corruption of nature, an eclipse of humanity itself. And yet, when we look at the night sky, the wonder we feel is surely for the stars, not the black veil behind them. So too, our wonder is for these men, whose sparks of courage shine bright through the distance of time. Their story of sacrifice and suffering, of constancy and compassion, illuminates the very essence of the Anzac spirit. For, of all our heroes, they were armed with human virtue alone and their victory was over the darkest recesses of the human heart.

To a superb tradition of self discipline under fire was added selflessness and ingenuity. To a heritage of wild reckless bravery was added cold calculated valour sustained for years. To the world, proof was given that tyranny, in the end, has no power over the courage and decency of ordinary men and women. It is an example to which we all aspire – as relevant in peace as to war, to our future as to our past. And on this sacred day, at this most sacred place, we honour all Australian service men and women who gave or offered their lives in war.

We pay tribute to our veterans, unique Australians who have known the blessings and hardship of both conflict and peace. On this day we give grateful thanks to friends and allies who shared our danger, and we add our pledge that their loyalty will neither be forgotten nor unreturned. On this day, we enrich ourselves for, it has been said, a national reveals itself not only by the men it produces but by the men it honours, the men it remembers. On this day most of all, we mourn the fallen – long years of love and talent lost, of potential unrealised, of generations unborn. We would have them know of our firm and steadfast belief that they rest not in shades of darkness but bask in the brightness of an Australian sun.

We would have them know that we will remember them."

Below is a message from a member of the public:

I would like to comment about the lovely manner and behaviour I saw this morning of one of your students at my bus stop. I catch a bus at the corner of Wellbank Street and Majors Bay Road, Concord and some of your students wait for their bus here.

This morning at 7.30 am there were about 10 boys waiting for the bus and an elderly gentleman with a walking frame came by. He stopped and started talking to the boys (one in particular who was an older boy). The elderly gentleman would have been close to 80 years old, a little bit fragile, dressed a little strange and not making much sense. Although some of the younger boys thought it was funny and were giggling, the older boy gave this man his time and spoke back to him. I watched on with much interest to ensure this elderly man was not mocked or spoken to in a bad manner.

The conversation would have lasted at least 5 minutes and although there was not much sense coming from the elderly man, the young student did not walk away or ignore this man. The longer the conversation went on, the less the giggling of the younger boys happen. These young men need to be reminded this could have been their grandfather or uncle (however it was stranger in the street). The young man showed respect and consideration for this elderly man. When the elderly man decided to walk away, the young man said 'thank you and have a lovely day'.

I wanted to pass on my observation and praise for the way this young man behaved and acted. The boys are dressed in your school uniform and are on display representing the school and its values. Well done for teaching these young men respect and especially to the older generations of the community.

CHANGE TO WATERFORD LEARNING CENTRE HOURS OF OPERATION
