**REFLECTION** At the beginning of most Highlights, I use a reflection to help us all reflect on significant issues around the school. The following reflection is from one of the school's teachers, Mr Arthur Sheen, and is about a real life situation here at CBHS. It is well worth a read: **Those repeated words "Blessed Edmund Rice" and "Live Jesus in our hearts"**.

Consider how many times students alone utter them here at CBHS each school day: Homeroom 1,320, five periods a day 6,600 not counting staff and other occasions, we have an average of around 7,800. Now let's consider how much power comes from those simple but very effective prayers. Our great and loving God hears our smallest whisper when we speak to Him; I can assure you the voices of 1,320 do not go unnoticed. I had the great pleasure of being witness to that very fact just last week. One Friday afternoon as I walked past the hectic but organised bus lines I spotted a young Year 5 boy sitting in line with tears streaming down his face. Instinct kicked in and I knelt down and asked him what was wrong. He found it hard to look up at me, yet when he did his face was covered in tears as his choked through broken voice said "n-n-n-othing Sir". Just behind him was another boy who I knew must have some idea so I asked him "What happened here?". The boy replied, pointing out two boys "these two boys have had a verbal scrap". The second boy had his head down and his cap covered his face so I reached down and lifted the peak of the cap. It was no surprise that he was also in tears and his nose was running. I then gave them an Edmund Rice value, covering how we sometimes forget to follow the path and we say things we do not really mean. I asked them to clean up their faces and shake hands. That is when I saw how powerful our prayers really are. The first boy I spoke to got tissues out of his bog and wiped the face of the other boy. For me, I witness the miracle of prayer and the intervention of Edmund. I asked them to shake hands and they reached out and hugged each other. Once again, the miracle of prayer and the heart of Jesus in our young men. I am sure small miracles happen every day here at CBHS. These wonderful events will stop the day we stop our prayer work. So the next time we invoke Blessed Edmund Rice and ask Jesus to live in our hearts consider the power you are putting out into our school. This is only one s

\$10 will buy four jembes or bush knives for farmers in Kenya (the same cost of a bottle of wine); \$20 will pay the monthly salary of a health care worker in a rural clinic in Cambodia (the same cost as a pizza and a couple of beers); \$35 will buy 10 white hens to start a poultry project in Fiji (the same cost as a haircut); \$50 will pay the monthly salary of a carpentry teacher at a youth training centre in Zambia (the same cost as a nice dinner for two); \$70 can buy two sacks of grain to feed two displaced families in southern Sudan for a month (the same cost as a pair of shoes); \$250 will buy a young, productive cow in Egypt (the same cost as ten CDs); \$300 will provide a community well in rural Zambia (the same cost as a compact camera). Just as Edmund Rice helped the needy children in Ireland in a practical way, so can we help those less fortunate to improve their lives.


#### **EVENTS NEXT TERM**



#### WATERFORD LEARNING CENTRE

#### It's official! The Waterford Learning Centre is a **GREAT SCHOOL LIBRARY!**

In October 2015, **FAIR** (Freedom of Access to Information and Resources) asked for nominations for **Great School Libraries** across Australia. To be accepted, the following criteria had to be met. Could the library help young people to?

- find reliable information and use it effectively?
- think critically and make informed decisions?
- work productively with others to build knowledge?
- safely navigate the internet?
- communicate and share their ideas?
- find great reads to meet personal interests and abilities?

Members of the school community made a number of submissions in support of the Waterford Learning Centre at CBHSL and the answer was **YES!** Staff at the Waterford Learning Centre facilitate all this and more, and have been recognised as one of **Australia's Great School Libraries** for 2015.

The Waterford Learning Centre is fortunate to have two professional teacher librarians, both with recent Masters Degrees specialising in e-Learning and Information Literacy. The team is completed by the dedicated support staff who work to ensure the library runs smoothly. We are fortunate to have a budget which enables us to purchase a wide range of quality literature to support our reading programs – STAR Reading during Home Room for all year groups, Accelerated Reader in Years 5 and 6, the Edmund Rice Wide Reading Challenge in Years 7 to 10, and the Waterford Readers' Club (which combines sessions with girls' school Domremy College) for Years 9 to 12. The Waterford Learning Centre homepage has links to online resources that support teaching and learning, and allows access to databases, referencing support, and specially curated websites. Both Mrs Toohey and Ms Martin work cooperatively with teachers to provide orientation to classes for these web-based materials.

The physical environment of the library is spacious and conducive to a wide range of leisure and academic pursuits, providing both individual and collaborative learning spaces. In the words of one student who wrote a submission:

I like coming to my school library because I enjoy the peace and tranquillity. When I walk through the library doors I feel happy—like walking through a curtain and seeing a new world on the other side.
